Rising 5th Grade Summer Reading Activities



- Complete the reading log for each of the books that you read this summer.
- Then, choose your favorite book you read this summer and complete ONE of the activities below. This will be a classwork grade, due Friday of the first week of school.

Activity Directions: - Write the title and author of your favorite summer book and your name at the top of your paper. (You may type the written parts if you want.)

1.) Write a letter to the author telling him/her what you liked most about the book and what you learned from the book. Ask the author 2-3 questions as well. (10 sentences or more)

OR

2.) Draw a comic strip that summarizes the 8 most important events in the story. Your comic strip should be a set of 8 or more illustrations with at least 8 detailed captions that explain the most important events of the story's plot. Please write the events in the order in which they happened.

OR

3.) Illustrate/draw a different book cover than the one the book actually has. Use color. The illustration should be half or a full page. Write 5 or more sentences to explain why you drew the cover the way you did.

OR

4.) Think about how the events, characters, and/or theme(s) in the story can be connected to your Christian faith or what Jesus would say and do. Write 8 sentences or more that explain this connection. Make sure you explain why the events, characters, or theme(s) you are writing about are related to something we can do as followers of Christ.

OR

5.) Think of a song you know that would really match this book. Maybe the song really goes with the events or characters or the lesson the reader learns. Write the title of the song and the singer or band. Then, explain why this song would be on a playlist for this novel. Write 8 or more sentences. (If you want, you can create your own song instead!)
